The Colonel's Comment

T'S been a long time since the last Regimental Roundup so, in this issue, there is an element of catch up as well as advance notice of other events. I have to say that the lack of communication has been down to my own lack of motivation. When I started to work on this edition, back in December these were my thoughts.

"I have to confess to the fact that I am struggling to see how I should continue as Commanding Officer of the Regiment. The lack of support for all events, sporting within the Regiment, Parades both National and Regimental and even just meetings leads me to believe that I am failing you as your leader. I am disappointed but feel that the time is now right to allow someone else to take up the reins to lead the Regiment for the next phase of the Brigades history in Manchester. I shall be tendering my resignation and at the AGM in January your leaders will be charged with finding a successor."

I have now notified Regimental staff and NHQ of my intention to step down as Commanding Officer and I ask you all to look seriously for someone to take over in due course. My final event will be the Regimental Parade at St Anne's Church in Manchester on the 28th October 2018, when we will have as our guest, Bishop Mark Davies. However, up to now, we lack a volunteer to replace me and provide some continuity of leadership. Add to that the current and seemingly increasing level of turmoil at the highest level in the Brigade leads me to believe that it would be grossly unfair of me to pass the burden to someone new and inexperienced. I am not saying that I will be any better than someone new but as the role of Commanding Officer also brings with it the role of Trustee to the National Organisation I cannot in all sincerity hand that load onto anyone else. I shall attempt to work with the Regimental staff to bring about a change of leadership in a controlled fashion. I ask for your prayerful support for the coming weeks and months.

In the coming months my Regimental Commander's meetings will be opened up for more of the leaders in the Regiment to have input and help to move the Regiment forward

June 26th: All Company Commanding Officers to have input.

September 18th: Adjutants, to organise the Regimental Parade and general administration.

November 6th: Sports & Social – Anyone who wants input to our activities both Sporting and social.

December 11th: Training staff

Denham Commemoration 2019

In July 2019 a weekend trip is being planned to Denham in Buckinghamshire. Denham is where the men and Lads' from the CLB did their training before going to war in the First World War. The survivors returned to Denham after the war, and paraded through the village to the Church they worshiped in before the war. The weekend and the Parade is to commemorate and remember the members of the 16th Battalion King Royal Rifles Corp who gave the supreme sacrifice during World War 1 and to celebrate the men who returned to Denham. The trip is being organised once more by Deputy Governor Martyn Bedder and his staff from Leicester Regiment and he has invited the whole Brigade family to join them. Following on from the successful events on the battlefields of Northern France last year this should be a remarkable event to be part of. The dates will be 13th& 14th July 2019, the booking form is available from CO's or from myself, John Corbishley. The cost will be approx. £35.00 for camping and a deposit of £15.00 per person is required by 29th September 2018.

The CLB & CGB as a National Organisation

OMPANIES may be surprised to hear that Capitation Fees, our annual payments to National Headquarters, are going up again this year, from £17 to £20 per head. They were also scheduled to rise again in the following years but those subsequent rises are on hold pending review next year. You probably wonder, how can we justify such an increase again. I, as your representative on Brigade Council have had the uncomfortable task of looking for solutions and ways to enable the Brigade, our Brigade to continue to exist as a National Organisation. We were faced with a budget deficit of approximately £28,000 for this financial year. Every conceivable way had been looked at and where possible implemented to reduce the burden of our NHQ operation on the Brigade. All available space in the building has been rented out, contracts for Insurance and utilities have all been pared down to the minimum and some functions brought in-house to reduce costs. Even so, the deficit was going to be too large to allow Brigade to continue functioning for more than the next couple of years.

At the Extraordinary Brigade Council meeting last month and confirmed at the AGM, we had to consider a last ditch move to salvage the Organisation by implementing a realisable Budget. After a protracted, emotional and unprecedented discussion, the proposal from the Staff and Finance Committee was passed to make the position of Chief Executive Officer redundant. I believe that should give every Officer in the Brigade an indication of how serious the situation is. This decision has been communicated to every Company.

So, what can we, the membership of the Brigade do to help


the situation and help the whole organisation? Despite all the negative reactions to the increases in Capitation fees, they are the only funding that will retain us as a National organisation, at present they are MUCH LOWER than any other comparable Youth organisation. If Companies are going to struggle to pay these then we must all consider what we charge for our services. We are known to be a very cheap child minding service by many. Look at what you charge and if necessary increase subscriptions to a realistic level but consider the impact, particularly on large families with more than one member. The only way we can ease our financial position longer term is to increase membership numbers. We can all operate within our comfort zone in terms of members but it's as easy to work with 12 members as it is to work with 6 and that may be possible with your existing leaders to members ratios. Both need two leaders as a minimum. Easiest initiatives are to encourage existing members to bring a friend or visit you local school and try to recruit new members. This is something you can do for yourself but Perry is still available to help or advise. If you are going to struggle speak to Regimental staff now and we may be able to help.

Do you claim GIFT AID? Only one in 10 companies do, so you probably don't! It is easy to do, it would pay your Capitation increase for you and (because NHQ retain 10% for the work they do to recover it for you) it also helps us to retain the National Staff. I will be producing a help sheet to advise you how to do this and will send one to every Company in the next month.

Your Regimental staff are here to help you, I am only a phone call away.

National York Minster Parade 2017

A big thank you to everyone who attended the Parade at York in November, we didn't manage to fill the coach from Manchester but those who went had a memorable day. It was a pleasure to parade behind the Massed band, mainly the National Band but with many additional visitors for the day. The route was fantastic, taking us through all the Christmas markets in the narrow ancient





streets of York, thronged with shoppers. The atmosphere was brilliant. As we approached the Minster, the magnificent West wall and window greeted us and towered over the parade. Once inside, we filled the front half of the nave and the rear half had a good number of parents and supporters seated. In the week before the parade our numbers had swelled to outgrow the Choir stalls and we had been allowed to move into the nave at no cost to the Brigade. It was wonderful to see so many in uniform seated together, enjoying an interesting service with a lot

of involvement for the members present. After the service we mustered outside the Minster to be inspected. The band played to a packed audience of shoppers, so many that it was difficult for the rest of us to find enough space to fall in. It was an incredible success and a testament to the organisation and planning that went into it by staff at NHQ and National Band.
